The 10th Asian City Journalist Conference "Asian cities and Sustainable Urban Development"

Jakarta, 20 October, 2015

The Asian City Journalist Conference (ACJC) has been held every year since 2006 with the aim to bring journalists in Asia together to exchange opinions and share knowledge on critical topics around urbanization, and to establish a network among media.

ACJC was always held in Fukuoka, Japan, with support of Fukuoka and local newspapers. Exceptionally, the 10th ACJC will take place in Jakarta on the occasions of the Asia-Pacific Urban Youth Assembly (APUFY, 17-18 Oct), the Sixth Asia-Pacific Urban Forum (APUF-6, 19-21 Oct) and the Habitat III Asia-Pacific Regional Meeting (21-22 Oct). Habitat III is the 3rd United Nations Conference on Housing and Sustainable Urban Development, to be held in Quito, Ecuador, from 17 through 20 October 2016.

This year, the ACJC will focus on "Asian cities and Sustainable Urban Development". The Conference always aims to share among journalists information on the state of Asian Cities and their problems in terms of urbanization. In 2015, the Conference will also share the new Sustainable Development Goals (SDGS), including Goal 11 on sustainable urbanization.

In addition, the conference will have the participating of "young journalists". On 18 October, there will be a young city journalist training (civic media training) during APUF-Y. Some participants will be presented to share their experience.

Five journalists from Asian cities will talk about their activities in the field of urban development and we will discuss the better city journalism.
